## Whitetail Cabins Burn

One day short of one week after a grand opening the new owners of the Whitetail Cabins five miles north of Seeley Lake were awakened early Tuesday morning by a fire that claimed four of the twelve rental cabins they recently purchased.

Two of the cabins burned to the ground with the exterior sides of two adjacent cabins charred and scorched to the point where they will probably be torn down rather than repaired.

The fire started in cabin number seven which was occupied by Wanda Weaver, Seeley Lake. No one was injured although Weaver was treated at the scene by the Seeley Lake QRU and released there. A car belonging to Weaver that was parked outside the cabin was completely destroyed.

Weaver managed to escape her smoke-filled cabin and awaken the owners, Tip and Pat Hooser. "By the time we got outside, it was blazing," Pat Hooser said.

Cause of the fire is still under investigation, according to Lloyd Hallgren, deputy sheriff.

Dave Sisk, Seeley Lake Volunteer Fire Department chief, said the call came in at 3:30 a.m. and the department responded with both engines on the scene about 17 minutes later.

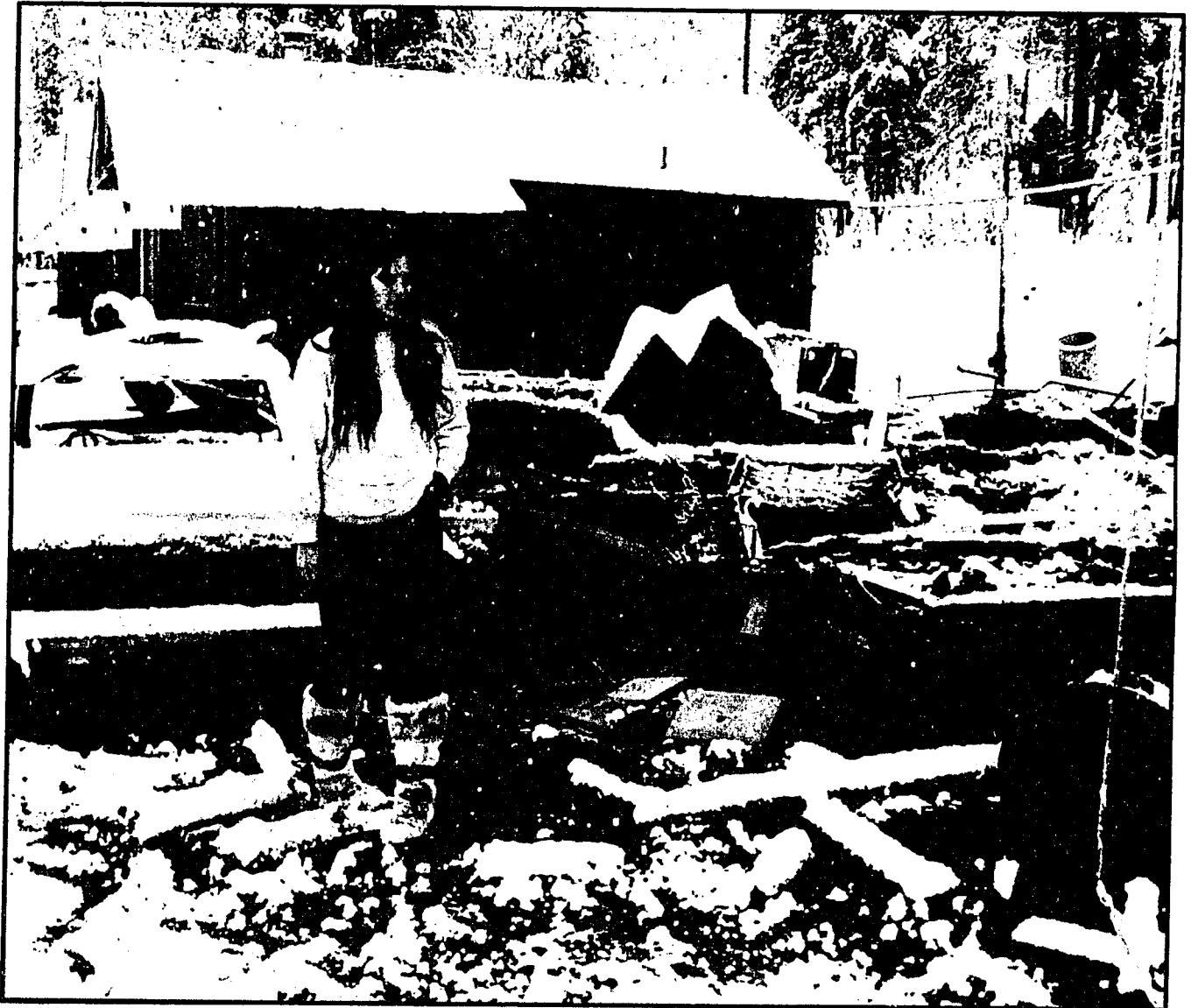
The area shortly was swarming with additional firemen and trucks from the Condon Fire Department, the Forest Service, and Plum Creek Timber.

"There were 27 firemen involved in addition to the QRU people," Sisk said.

Colin Moon of the Seeley Lake Fire Department was in charge of the fire fighting effort.

"By the time we got there, two of the buildings and a car were fully involved and we had our hands full right off the bat," he said.

The cabins are outside the Seeley Lake water district and both engines, one holding 750 gallons and the other 500 gallons, were out of water about 15

minutes after reaching the scene.

The trucks were refilled from a hydrant at the Seeley Lake Ranger Station and later a drop tank holding 1500 gallons was brought in with trucks pumping water into the tank to keep it full.

Moon praised the mutual effort from the other services with special note of appreciation to the Condon fire department. "We were really pleased with their work this morning. They did a really good job," he said.

He also expressed appreciation to Don Weaver, Missoula Electric Co-op lineman, who worked to disconnect electrical lines and Hallgren and Ron Ogden who directed traffic.

Traffic was a problem with heavy snow coming to the area at the same time.

Pat Hooser said the cabins were not insured, but expressed determination to rebuild. "This won't stop us," she said. "But it hurts."

The Hoosers, from Globe, Arizona, purchased the cabins in July and after

extensive remodeling held an open house on Wednesday, November 23.

Despite the loss, she was thankful that no one was injured. "All the cabins were occupied except the ones that burned," she added.

## Shiner benefit here Saturday

Organizers are planning an auction, a potluck dinner, and live music.

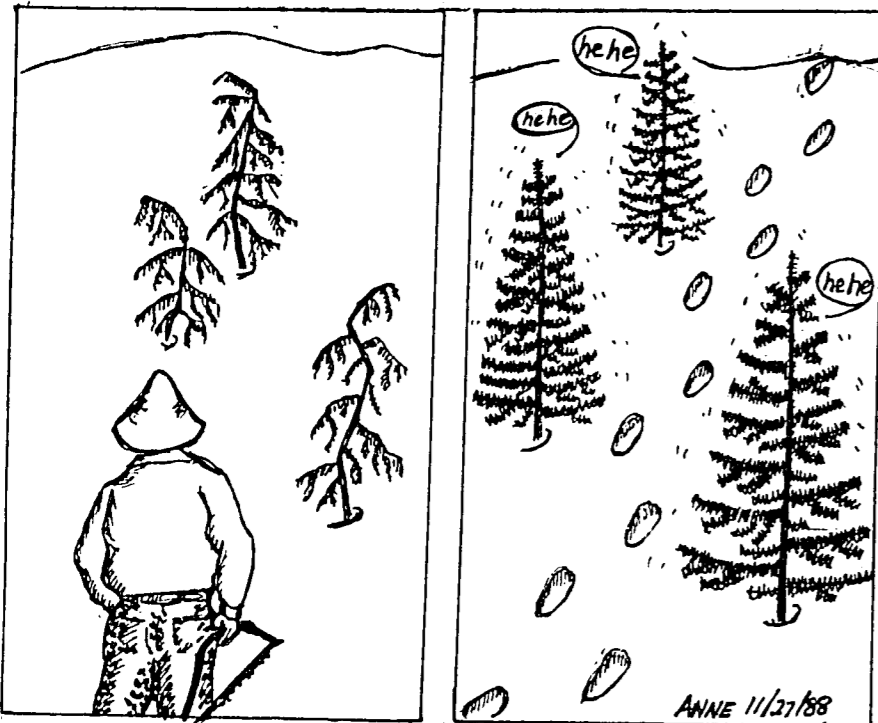
Laura Pulliam said the Community

## Subject: Water System

To the Editor:

In reference to Leo Perro's letter to the Editor in the November 10th issue of the Pathfinder, the Water Board does not agree with all of Mr. Perro's conclusions.

One of the major leaks required the replacement of 600' of A.C. pipe on Black Bear Lane at substantial cost to the District. The fact that the A.C. pipe is less than 4' underground in some places and not at the required 6' in many others, plus the fact that the pipe has not been properly bedded according to specification in many, many places in both the original district and Phases IA and II of Double Arrow, leaves the District at risk for large dollar outlays for repairs and replacement. **THE SYSTEM IS NOT IN SUCH GREAT SHAPE.**

The October, 1988 Income and Expense Statement for the first 10 months of 1988 shows a total operating loss of \$30,015.70 and net loss (when adjusted for Double Arrow debt Amortization) of \$5,499.95. A good share of the operating loss was caused by the cost of repairing leaks and the leak detection program. A portion of the District's revenue comes from non-operation income, installation fees,

construction, pro-rate fees and materials sold, therefore, this income varies depending on activity. **THE WATER SYSTEM IS NOT SO FINANCIALLY SOUND.**

System up-dates are required and will be a part of the Water Boards on going program for improved service and reduced expense. There are fire hydrants that have insufficient pressure. Engineering firms have been telling us since 1984 that our storage capacity is marginal for sustained fire fighting capability. The Board will be taking a hard look at installing additional storage. The Board intends to install mechanical and electronic monitoring systems to insure proper accountability for all water produced. Because of the age and suspect quality of the construction of the system, an on-going leak detection program will be continued. Action in these areas cost money. The Board does not intend to leave the system "status quo" - it has been neglected too many years.

A point to remember — the costly problem of filtration may still have to be dealt with.

Both Mr. Perro and the Water District Manager have down played the success of the leak detection program. The program identified most of the major leaks with the exception of the Tamaracks (which surfaced and was

reported by a passer-by). It further identified valves and lines that had not been previously located. They mapped all service locations in the district. They also checked all fire hydrants. The program operated from July through the first part of September at a minimum cost and the part-time employees did an outstanding job. The program also saved the district money. The manager had been using a leak detection company at a cost of approximately \$1,000.00 per day, with little or no result.

Again—contrary to some opinions—there is a lot of work to be done and considerable expense involved to make the water district a first class operation.

## Wood toys are durable

This Christmas you might want to think about a home-grown, home-made product for under the Christmas tree, especially for the young children who are on your gift list.

Grown in Montana wood is being

turned into durable hand-finished toys "Made in Montana," in fact right here in Seeley Lake in a fledgling operation started in October this year.

The Fun Times Toys company is an offshoot of people at the Good Times retail store in Seeley Lake where the toys are offered for sale.

"It was an idea born at the kitchen table by myself, my son, Patrick, and my daughter-in-law, Leslie," said Susan Shea, Good Times owner.

The idea has turned into a lot of work for Warren Gault who also became involved and now cuts out all the component parts and assembles the toys.

"The toys are made mostly of pine with some fir and larch being used, and the wheels are made out of Igem, an imported Philippine hardwood," Gault said.

Joy Clemens, local artist, has helped out with many of the ideas, Shea said, drawing designs and templates for many of the toys.

The product is catching on even though starting in a small way and shipments of orders have been made to Columbia Falls, Chicago and New York, Shea said.

Three sales reps are now promoting the toys, she added.

The product line keeps getting more varied with wooden Christmas tree ornaments, rocking horses and cradles, and several different push and pull toys.

"My grandson, Benjamin, is the toy tester," Shea said, indicating that if Benjamin likes it, it must be okay.

The toys get a hand-rubbed oil finish and accent paint.

All the oils and paint products used on the toys have passed approval by the poison control board and are non-toxic, Shea and Gault stressed. At one point, the ingredients in one product were read to the board over the telephone and a computer check showed no toxics.

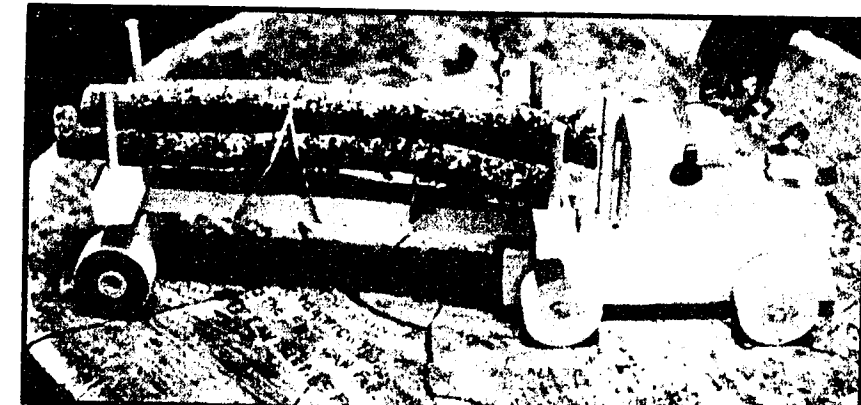

## Study on elk migration habits topic of Wilderness Club meeting

Two meetings are upcoming this week which should be of interest to anyone concerned with area big game animals.

The December 1 regular meeting of the Wilderness Sportsman's Club will be at 7:30 p.m. at the REA building. Mike Thompson and Mark Hurley will be presenting preliminary results of the first year of Mark's study on the Blackfoot-Clearwater elk population and migration. They began last winter trapping and collaring bull elk with radio collars. Last spring a population survey was run and throughout the summer and fall the radio-collared animals have been tracked to determine migration areas and habits. This should be a very informative program.

A second meeting hosted by the Montana Department of Fish, Wildlife

and Parks will be held this next Monday, December 5, at 7:00 p.m. at Seeley Lake Community Hall. This will be a public meeting for the discussion of the proposed purchase of the Dreyer Ranch for addition to the Blackfoot-Clearwater Management Area and is very important to all area sportsmen and anyone involved in any way with hunting in the valley.

The department is in need of public input to proceed with plans. As the Blackfoot-Clearwater is the major wintering ground, and the Dreyer ranch a primary migration route and wintering area for elk utilizing the Seeley Lake area, it is of the utmost importance that we, as area sportsmen, show strong support for this purchase.

If you cannot make both meetings, please plan to attend the meeting December 5th at the Seeley Lake Community Hall and voice your support of the area elk herd.

## Fish, Wildlife & Parks

### Hearing on Dreyer Ranch purchase

A public hearing by the Montana Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks will offer the public an opportunity to comment on the proposed purchase of the Dreyer Ranch, near Clearwater Junction.

The hearing will be held Monday, December 5, 1988, at the Seeley Lake Community Hall, in Seeley Lake at 7:00 p.m.

The Dreyer Ranch is adjacent to the FWP Blackfoot-Clearwater Wildlife

Management Area, and the proposed purchase would protect and enhance wildlife habitat and an important migration corridor for about 1,500 elk. Funding for the acquisition would come from hunting license fee increases authorized under House Bill 526 in 1987 by the State Legislature.

A proposed Wildlife Area Management Plan for the Dreyer Ranch is available at FWP headquarters in Missoula.

### Forestry discussion to highlight meeting

Integrated forestry will be the topic of the Raptor Room's Friday Forum to be held December 2 at 8 p.m., Swan Valley Community Hall, Condon.

Donald M. Wood, private forester, will discuss different aspects of forest management, with an emphasis on protection of wildlife habitat.

Wood has 28 years experience in forest management: 13 years with state forest agencies in Montana, Alaska, Idaho and 15 years as a private forestry consultant. He is an active supporter and past chairman of the Montana Tree Farm Program and also serves on the Governor's Ad Hoc Committee on Forest Resources. Wood also serves on the Board of Directors for the Raptor Room, Swan Valley's wildlife rehabilitation center.

Friday Forum is presented the first Friday of each month as a public service of The Grounded Eagle Foundation.

He was preceded in death by a brother, Robert, and a sister, Helen Lee.

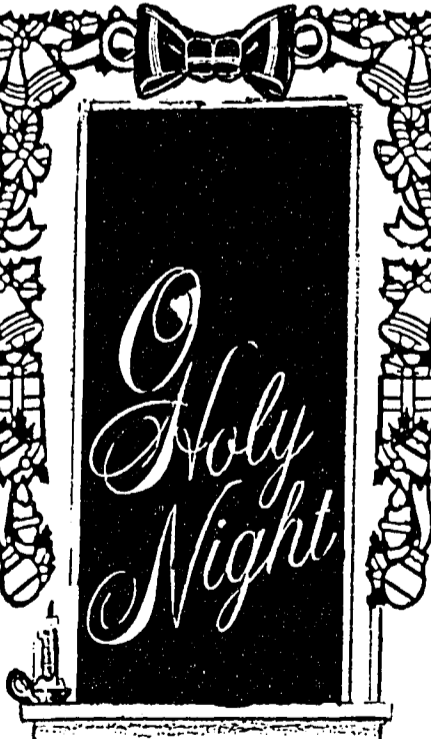

## What is an Animal Inn?

by Kathy Davis

Students in the third grade at Seeley Lake and Ovando learned just what an 'Animal Inn' was through a new program sponsored by the U.S. Forest Service. The program was made especially for students in the 3rd grade. It is supposed to help people understand why animals need places to stay and what we all can do to make sure that they have homes left in the woods for them. Many of these homes are in special kinds of trees that have places of shelter for wildlife of all kinds; including insects and birds. The purpose of the program is to teach people how to recognize wildlife trees and encourage them to save the trees.

Animal Inn was started on the Deschutes National Forest in Oregon in July of 1986. It began as a cooperative between Oregon, Washington and the Forest Service. Its objective is to get woodcutters to save certain kinds of trees reserved for Animal's Inns and to raise awareness with the general public about the values of dead trees as wildlife habitat.

Wildlife trees can be recognized by the cavities, broken tops, sawdust around the base of the trees from ants or by paint on the tree where foresters mark "leave tree". There are over 40 different birds and mammals that live in the snags in our area and the best type of trees for wildlife are larch, ponderosa pine and Douglas-fir. This program was designed NOT to discourage firewood cutting — but to save certain dead trees. We want to encourage people to confine their woodcutting to:

\* Snags with 'spike tops' or trees

where the tops are intact.

\* Trees without visible rot (this will make better firewood anyway)

\* Downed material (this material, usually available, can be harvested without the risk of sawing accidents)

Kay Enycart of the Seeley Lake Ranger Station presented the program and talked to the children about the concept of "Animal Inns". At the end of the program, Smokey Bear, alias Margaret Doherty, gave the students a Smokey Bear trash bag with a Smokey Bear bookmark, ruler, sticker, balloon and color page.

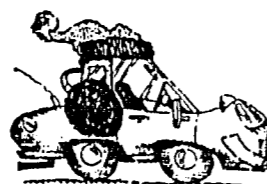
### Gun shot results in arrest

### Have you ever died?

## PASSAGES

Pastor Jeff Crippen

We have all read or heard of people who were injured or seriously ill and nearly died. In fact, some of them believe they did die and came back to life. Bright lights, tunnels, floating above their body and so on are characteristic of what they experienced. If we were to ask such people, "have you ever died?", some would answer "yes".

The Bible makes it very clear that Jesus Christ is asking each one of us this same question — "have you ever died?". But He is not referring to some out-of-body experience. Rather, Jesus has in mind the paradoxical truth that if you I ever expect to be in heaven, that is, if we expect live forever, we must die and be brought back to life as a completely new person. Is this reincarnation? Hardly. Listen as the Apostle Paul explains it —

"Knowing this, that our old self was crucified with (Christ), that our body of sin might be done away with, that we should no longer be slaves to sin." (Romans 6:6)

When you were born as a baby, you were born, as Paul says, a "slave to sin." Sin is the master of every human being. Our nature we are born with

knows how to sin and enjoys doing so. It is this "old man" who must die if we are ever going to really live.

You can try all you want to "clean up" the old man. You can try to be more honest. You can resolve to stop drinking and swearing. You can vow that you will never again commit a particular sin. But, the old you will still be alive and unacceptable to God. No getting around it. If you want to live forever, you've got to die.

How does this happen? Only through Jesus Christ. Only He can nail the old you to the cross, bury you with Him in the tomb, and bring you back to life as a brand new son of God. That's what Jesus meant when he told Nicodemus, "you must be born again."

Jesus is ready to re-create you. The question is, are you ready to let Him? He only acts by invitation — your invitation. Ask Him and you can say with Paul:

"I have been crucified with Christ; and it is no longer I who live, but Christ lives in me. (Galatians 2:20)

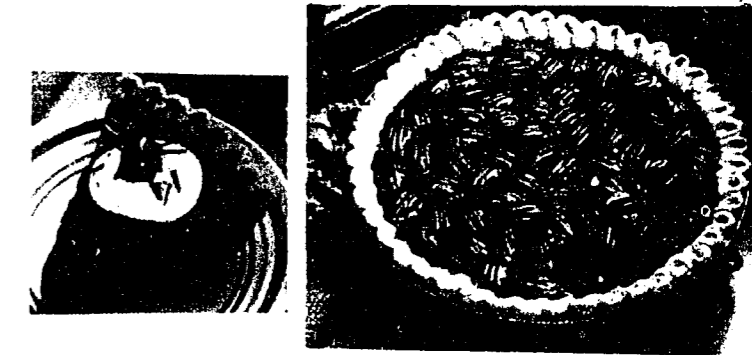


