Governor's Cup 500 renamed for Centennial

The Montana Centennial Sled Dog Race today announced the support of this event by the Montana Centennial Committee, Kessler Beer, Eagle Brand Pet Foods and Northern Energy, a Montana propane and appliance business.

The race is scheduled to start on Saturday afternoon, February 11, following the traditional Friday night banquet at Carroll College.

This race, being run for the fourth year is normally called The Governor's Cup, but has been temporarily renamed

to celebrate the passing of Montana's 100th birthday.

In addition to the corporate contributions, the race has taken on a new marketing effort to sell shirt and hats as an important element in their fundraising effort.

Compared to other similar events in this rapidly growing sport, this 500 mile event remains the longest endurance sled dog racing contest in the lower 48 states.


This year several hundred volunteers, including four snowmobile

More on water system

To the Editor:

The December 1 issue of the Pathfinder contained a letter from Bob Scott stating that the Water Board does not agree with all of my conclusions regarding the water system. I'll respond to some items in this letter and the balance in a future letter.

It stated that I had down-played the success of the leak detection program. This surprises me. I have been pushing for fixing the large water waste problem for the last three years. I wrote a report to the Water Board outlining the magnitude of the problem in 1985. Again, in 1987, I wrote a report on the water system and urged that the waste be corrected. In the spring of 1988, in two Water Board meetings, I restated my feelings that the leaks needed fixing. And now that Bud Anderson has been able to reduce the average use from more than 2,000 gallons per day to less than 400 gallons per day, a savings of more than 500,000 gallons per day, how can I down-play the success. The facts speak for themselves-1988 was the most successful year the water district has ever had. It was this success plus the work that the general manager had accomplished in previous years in getting the pumps and equipment, including the pump house itself, in top shape that let me to conclude that the water system is in great shape. This does not mean that the system has no remaining leaks. IT DOES! It does not mean that the system won't freeze up again. IT WILL! It does not mean that

the best shape it has ever been in! Can the Water Board or the general when the system has been in better shape? Can they identify any other rural water system in the state of Montana that is in any better shape?

major leaks won't again develop. THEY

WILL! Nevertheless, the system is in

I am aware of the concern that the team (general manager and Water Board) have regarding the risks associated with pipes—be they AC or PVC—not being buried 6 feet or greater and, also, the concern of bedding that is not to specification. But let's not forget that pipes at 4 feet, when covered by undis-

turbed snow, will probably not freeze as fast as pipes at 6 feet in saturated soil with no snow cover. Also, it is my understanding that the "shallow" pipes have been in the system for some time and have not as yet caused a problem. Someday they might-only time will tell. As for the bedding issue, it is my understanding that problems caused by poor bedding generally show up within a year or so after installation. To date, how many problems can be specifically tied to improper bedding? None that I can find in reviewing the last 15 years of District records. Again, I am aware of the concerns but I'm still of the opinion that the system is in great shape.

The point that 600 feet of pipe was replaced in Black Bear Lane is a good one. It does not effect my assessment of the system being in great shape, since the replacement occurred prior to my assessment. I could argue that all 600 feet did not need to be replaced. I could argue that even though the best available leak location failed to pinpoint the leaks, other approaches could have been used to reduce the amount of pipe requiring replacement. I could, but I won't, because the success of 1988 would make me a nit-picker. The real point is that some leaks are very difficult to pinpoint and can wind up being expensive to repair. Even leak location systems costing \$1,000.00 per day are sometimes ineffective.

I'll address the rationale for my concluding that the district is financially sound and why a rate reduction is in order in my next letter. That letter will be followed by a letter outlining my rationale for claiming that adding storage to the system is not a cost effective thing to do nor is it necessary to raise pressure in the few hydrants that are "insufficient." The voters should think twice before voting "yes" on these two improvements.

By the way, it sure is hard to give some fellars a pat on the back.





Radio broadcast turned him to preaching

On Sunday, Christmas Day, millions of people around the world will celebrate the birth of the Lord, Jesus Christ. Preachers will step up to the pulpit in Seeley Lake, Condon and Swan Lake and share the gospel message with their friends, families and neighbors.

But for many, there will be doubts about the integrity of the church in America. Preachers today are making news in national publications. The headlines reflect corruption in the church. This "news" doesn't surprise at least one of the old-timers in the busi-

"They are preaching churchianity without a lot of Christianity," according to Pastor H.L. Inabnit of Sceley Lake. "Satan is wearing the New Age and other coats, and he's deceiving Christians." He adds that the devil hits people with ability the hardest.

"None of us can stand up and boast. That's a hazard, and the devil is out after every aggressive Christian. He's on their

Pastor Inabnit, now 82 years old, has spent the past 50 years teaching people about the Bible and preaching the gospel message from the pulpit. He recently finished writing a book about his life, Plow to Pulpit. The book provides insights about Montana history-from the Great Depression through World War II and into the New Age—a view from behind the pulpit that few people see or understand.

Inabnit calls himself a "two-by-four

"I didn't get much of that fancy schooling," he laughs. He grew up on his parents' huge, sprawling cattle ranch in the East Flathead country north of Bozeman. With his five brothers and one sister, he helped operate the family sawmill, wrangled cattle and dodged bootleggers as a teenager. While in his mid-twenties, he heard the gospel message on a radio broadcast and decided then and there that he would serve the Lord. That action forever changed his

"I thought I was gonna be a cattle rancher, like my Pop. But the Lord had different things in mind," he laughs.

Pastor Inabnit has helped to build nine churches in Montana. For about twenty years of his career he presented radio broadcasts of the gospel message to people in Bozeman, Missoula and Kalispell. He and his wife, Ruth, started youth groups, Bible studies, and helped to organize the Lake Blaine Bible Camp south of Kalispell. They helped to establish the Baptist Church at Seeley Lake in 1953. In recent years, Pastor and Ruth Inabnit moved back to Secley Lake to retire. When they aren't working on writing books, they enjoy visiting with friends, supplying for various churches in western Montana, and also keep busy with woodworking projects. The Inabnits built their own home and a guest house almost entirely of mill ends from Pyramid Lumber Co.

Today, Pastor Inabnit can recite nearly the entire Bible from memory. He has written half a dozen books about the Bible, including one about the book of Genesis that appears to be turning

some heads in the upper ranks of Bible

Inabnit hesitates to judge churches, but he agrees that there is a dangerous trend among many modern groups to stray away from the words of scripture. That trend is causing problems in many churches.

"The norm among Christians is to stay by the Bible", Inabnit says. "A lot of people think that if you're goodhonest and upright-you'll go to heaven. That's not true. Nicodemus was probably as good a man as ever walked and Christ said he must be born again. Everybody must be born again. That's from John 3: 7."

How does one become born again? "You gotta pray the sinner's prayer—get down on your knees and ask the Lord to save your soul."

Inabnit explained that the hardest people to win to Christ are the good people-the church people. "I've seen more people come to Christ in jails and rest homes and hospitals and prisons than I've seen come to Christ in


He says that, ideally, a church should be like a restaurant. "The ministry from the pulpit is the setting of the table. But you gotta keep 'em in the restaurant," he said. First, he explained, you bring people to Christ with the gospel message. "Then we need to teach people in Christ. Thirdly, churches need to send people out for Christ."

Inabnit said that he often visits with young preachers. He shares with them some of the hard lessons he had to learn during the early years of his min-

"You come out of Bible school sort of visionary—the idea that 'I'm gonna do a great deal for God.' Pretty soon it dawns on you that God's gonna do a great thing for you. Quite a difference.

"The basic thing to ask yourself about any preacher is this: Is he doing the job for Christ?"

Some modern-day church leaders

enjoy extraordinary, materialistic lifestyles, Inabnit said. Most Christian preachers, he explained, know that their chosen careers will probably not bring them financial wealth. "We are rich in spirit; our rewards are in heaven," he chuckled.

Inabnit wouldn't have been able to support his family by working only as a preacher. He worked at other jobs throughout his ministry to put food on the table for his wife, six children, his mother, and mother-in-law.

"I don't think we made a ten dollar bill the whole time," he joked. "But we didn't go in debt either." His salary as a preacher sometimes dipped to as low as

"That was February, at Dry Creck, during the Great Depression," he said. People in his congregation were good to him. Even though they couldn't offer money they brought fresh meat, bacon and potatoes. Inabnit opened a sawmill that winter with equipment from the old home ranch. That sawmill, it turned


out, was a real work of God. "I wouldn't have been able to reach the men without it," he said, adding that the small country churches in that area near Bozeman were made up of women and children By the time Inabnit left Dry Creek, there were just as many men as women in the congregation.

"I don't think it hurts a preacher to work. If he's poor, he'll talk to the Lord a little more. Jesus said, 'My Father works, and I work."" Does Pastor Inabnit have any re-

grets about his fifty years behind the

"Nope. I think it's the greatest business in the world."

Inabnit printed only a small quantity of his book, Plow to Pulpit, in order to have the story available for Christmas. Most of those copies have already been sold to family members and friends. This winter, he hopes to publish an edited version of his book which will be available locally and at Christian book stores throughout Montana.



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Find your Christmas tree in the forest

A winter outing on the National Forest lands to carefully select and cut just the right Christmas tree is a ritual observed by many Forest users.
Within Flathead National Forest

boundaries, you do not need a permit to cut a Christmas tree for personal use. If you are unsure of land ownership, maps showing the Forest boundary are available at any District office or the

Supervisor's office in Kalispell.

The Lolo National Forest policy is somewhat different in that it varies from district to district. The Seeley Lake Ranger District does not require a permit to cut a Christmas tree for personal use. Maps showing the district boundary are available at the Ranger Station office.


Areas to avoid while Christmas tree cutting are: campgrounds, well traveled roads, areas of concentrated use and sites posted "closed" to Christmas tree

You will find a wide variety of trees available to fit your decorating needs. The most popular species are Douglasfir, alpine fir, grand fir and lodgepole
pine. These trees hold their needles
longer after cutting than another popular
tree, the Engelmann spruce. A handy
species identification guide, Trees of
Northwest Montana, is available at any
Elathead National Forcet administration Flathead National Forest administrative office to help in identifying tree species.

Please use caution while driving


Forest roads, especially in the winter. Remember, the only plowed roads are those being used by logging traffic. It is a good idea to check with your local Ranger District before leaving home to identify areas with winter logging

When you arrive back home, store your tree in a cool, shady location until you are ready to decorate it. To keep your tree fresh indoors, recut the stump area and place it in a stand containing








Press kit promotes musher races in Seeley Swan

A press kit is being sent to 1,000 publications, travel writers, and television and radio stations. The fortypage document is designed to increase nation-wide excitement for Montana's sled dog races, according to Charles vanHook of Helena, a promoter for the Governor's 500 (called the Centennial 500 this year). A press kit provides

information to encourage publicity.

Glacier Country Tourism Commission, the northwest Montana group responsible for spending a portion of the money collected from the accommodations tax, is contributing \$1,000 to the project.


Gold West Country, southwest Montana's tourism group, is also

Bass Tourney possible in Seeley Lake

The Montana B.A.S.S. Federation has proposed to hold a Mr. Bass Tournament on May 20-21, 1989, from 6 a.m. to 3 p.m. each day at Seeley Lake. The Montana Fish and Game Commission will consider the proposal at its January 25-26, 1989 meeting.

At least 50 participants are expected to compete for a cash prize of \$500 and

merchandise worth approximately \$2,000. Winners will be determined by the most points received based on the length of fish caught. The proposed entry fee is \$25.

In making its decision, the Commission must consider what impacts the proposed tournament might have on the fishery and aquatic resources of the area

The Montana Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks will be soliciting comments from persons interested in, or potentially affected by, the derby through January 6, 1989. Comments should be sent to the Fisheries Division, Montana Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks, 1420 East Sixth Avenue, Helena, MT 59620.



Forest Service Payments up in counties

Missoula, MT: Forty-seven counties in Montana, northern Idaho, eastern Washington, western South Dakota, and North Dakota will share in payments totaling \$15,475,393.81 which is 25 percent of the FY 1988 revenue earned by the National Forests within the Northern Region.

Payments were up considerably in Missoula, Lake and Powell counties over FY 1987 payments. Missoula County received \$358,415 for FY 1988 (FY 1987 was \$279,057); Powell County received \$362,275 for FY 1988 (FY 1987 was \$251,803); and Lake County received \$166,301 (FY 1987 was \$89,073).

Forest Service revenue is from timber sales, grazing fees, land-use fees, recreation charges, utility fees, mineral revenues, and admission and user fees. The base from which shares were figured also includes credits made to timber purchasers for building roads, salvage sale fund collections, and sale area betterment collections.

Regionally, National Forest revenues increased 13 percent comparing FY 1988 with FY 1987. The Flathead and Deer Lodge National Forests share of receipts show increases which can be attributed to accelerated logging activity due to improved market conditions and 5-year extension programs nearing completion.

In contrast, other Forests show reductions into the counties due to the sales selected for logging by timber companies. Reduced volume available on certain forests also appeared to have an effect on companies moving to other forests.

Counties share in the receipts of the individual National Forests in accordance with the acreage of National Forest within the county.

Turkey hunting areas expanded

A new western Montana turkey hunting area with 25 more special hunting permits is on tap for turkey hunters this spring if the Montana Fish and Game Commission adopts the tentative 1989 Spring Turkey Hunting Regulations in January.

The new turkey hunting area will lie along the St. Regis and lower Clark Fork rivers in Mineral and western Missoula counties in deer and elk hunting districts 200, 201 and 202.

In addition, the tentative spring turkey regulations, set by the commission in Bozeman on December 9, call for an expansion of spring turkey hunting in central and eastern Montana in areas where special hunting permits are not required.

The spring turkey hunting season is tentatively set to run from April 15 through May 7, 1989.



Surtax expires Dec. 31

More money in your pocket

Montanans will have more takehome pay next year, when the 10 percent state surtax expires December 31, 1988, Montana Department of Revenue officials said today.

The surtax was enacted by the 1987 Montana Legislature for calendar years 1987 and 1988. Governor Ted Schwinden's Executive Budget for Fiscal Years 1990-91 recommends a balanced budget without continuing the surtax.

With the expiration of the surtax, state tax withholding tables will be revised. A single worker with an annual

income of \$20,000 can expect a \$76 increase in take-home pay; while a family of four with an income of \$35,000 will gain \$141 annually without the surtax.

The Department of Revenue will send out a tax booklet with the new 1989 tax tables at the end of December. The booklet will be mailed to all businesses registered with the Department's Business Tax section. Business owners who do not receive the booklet by the second week of January may order one by calling 406/444-3388.

Estimated tax payments due Jan. 17


The Internal Revenue Service reminds people who make estimated tax payments that the fourth installment for 1988 is due on January 17, 1989.

The payment should be sent to the IRS along with the fourth quarter voucher from Form 1040ES, Estimated Tax for Individuals. To be sure that the payment is properly credited to your account, write your social security number and the words, "1988 Form 1040ES" on the check.

Usually, people who are selfemployed or who have income not

covered by withholding, such as interest, dividends, or rental income, are required to make estimated tax payments. If you had two jobs at the same time this year or were laid off and received unemployment benefits, you may need to make estimated payments. A good rule of thumb, the IRS says, is to make an estimated tax payment by the January deadline if you expect to owe \$500 or more in federal tax at the end of this year. To avoid a penalty, you

must pay at least 90 percent of your tax liability this year.
