

iams 4, Sadie Linford 4, and Blair Barthelmess 1.


The Ladyhawks retired for the holiday season with a 54-45 win over Deer Lodge here last Friday, putting the Ladyhawks in

Seeley Lake Town Meeting Large and Lively

Community Council

Approximately 65 people attended the fall Seeley Lake Community Council meeting of infrastructure providers, making it our biggest meeting ever. Chairman, Sam Bolton, welcomed over 20 organizations who were represented at the meeting. Keynote presentations were given about housing, national forest management, county roads and wildland/community interface fire prevention. Stan Nicholson moderated a rapidfire sesion, while several other institutions gave bullet updates and announcements about their services.

In fact, so much valuable information was presented that it's not possible to fit it all in one news report. Consequently, we've decided to parcel out the report in an on-going series of smaller bytes in the Pathfinder. First, we'll share what the keynote speakers had to say

Housing - For the past 10-12 years our valley has been growing at the rate of about 40 new houses per year. Nevertheless, a number of people employed in our community commute from Missoula because they cannot find affordable housing here. The lack of suitable housing for wage earners has been identified as a negative factor for our community. According to one estimate, it represents an economic loss of \$750.000.

Brendan Moles, of the Human Resource Council (HRC), explained that HRC is a private, nonprofit organization serving


Missoula, Ravalli and Mineral Counties with assistance for food, health, heating, housing, day care, support groups and other areas of concern. Moles handles the Homeowner Repairs Program as well as the Rehab Loans and the Homebuyer Assistance Program. The latter program, aimed at firsttime homebuyers offers a 0% loan with deferred payments, designed to bridge the gap between the cost of a home and what the buyer can afford. National Forest Management - The Seeley Lake community depends on the surrounding forest area both for economic and social well being. Almost half of the valley is public land managed by the USDA Forest Service. Lee Kramer, Planning Staff Officer for the Lolo National Forest, spoke of the 1986 Forest Plan which provided the strategic vision, broad land use allocations, and management constraints for our surrounding national forest lands. It is now time to revise that plan, and the Forest Service intends to depend heavily on public input as it formulates an updated plan. Kramer is specifically looking for ways to involve local people. The first step is to look closely at the existing plan to evaluate what is working well and what needs revised. Kramer will then return next spring to discuss what issues need to be addressed. Citizens wanting to be-

tion to decrease the likelihood of a wildfire in the forest adjacent to the school. In the near future, a contract will be advertised to draft a fire plan for the Seeley-Swan area. The plan will cover about 500,000 acres and have three main parts: 1) inventory (e.g., roads, structures, ownership, utilities, water sources, fuels), 2) risk assessment, 3) value assessment. Important byproducts of this project will be the production of an accurate map and better agency coordination and effectiveness for dealing with fire (and other) emergencies.

Another year ! went home from college, and then spent most of the Christmas break on a backpacking trip in Ontario's Algonquin Provincial Park. Fortunately, it was milder weather than the time my car froze up at 40-below in Wawa, near Lake Superior.



So, the trip wasn't seasoned with uncommon suffering as we year. snowshoed the frozen lakes, night after night, howling for wolves.

On the sixth night, we were howled out and discouraged. One guy and I huddled silently around the fire, while our companion stole some early shut-eye in his tent.

"Owoooooooooo," came the low, lone call from the other side of the lake. My spine shivered like the playing field of that old electric football game. Then, "Owooo," and before the lone wolf could finish the woods erupted with the full chorus of its nack.

(I've re-enacted this very moment to young children around a campfire at night. It can be very effective, depending upon how much psychological scarring your conscience will allow you to inflict, and how good an echo you can make in the mountains around you.)

Anyhow, we spent the night howling back and forth, and the wolves finished it with one final chorus within about 30 yards of our tents-barely beyond the moonshine. We never saw the animals, only their tracks, and the passage

It was the timethe years-that my Dad had spent with me, learning about my interests, encouraging me to do things for myself, teaching me what I needed to know, that allowed him to give a gift that meant far more than the product itself.

By the time you read this, it'll be too late to run to a sporting goods store for a big-ticket purchase in time for Christmas. But, it won't be too late to give the best gift of all to the ones who matter the most to you.



Record Whitetail

Several years ago for Christmas, I received a small, oddshaped package. Inside was the last insult of the hunting season---my mom had battered and fried my deer and elk tags, then gave them to me as a gift.

And, according to Fish, Wildlife & Parks, moms like mine will have lots of tags to cook this year for that special someone because of another mild-weathered hunting season. This makes the third mild fall in the past four years, and that decreases hunter success in the field.

While harvest was down for both elk and deer, elk hunters were the least successful.

While there are no check stations in the immediate area, the follows:

Swan: 2,749 Hunters, down than last year: 8 mule deer, down 2; and 280 whitetail deer, down 68 from last year. Only 10.7 percent of the hunters had game compared to 13 percent last year.

Bonner: 7,436 Hunters, down 431 from last year; 100 elk, down 32: 100 mule deer, down 36; and 470 whitetail deer, down 47. Only 9.1 percent of the hunters had game compared to 10 percent last year. According to the Missoulian,

taxidermists are stating that while numbers are down, the size of the mounts are up, which brings us to the Montana State Record Whitetail.

In 1974, Tom Dellwo was up Deer Creek hunting. Meat was the purpose of the hunt, but the buck he got was more than just good meat.

"I thought it was a nice buck, but I found out it was a really nice buck," Dellwo said. "My wife's cousin thought it was a great buck, and he wanted to take it to the University and have it scored. It turned out to be a record."

The show will also be in Great Falls January 3rd, 4th and 5th, and Livingston on March 15th.






