

It was a crowning achievement to get into the State Class B Tournament this year. We thought it was good enough to be called the "first time ever", knowing that we've been there before, but thinking we were Class C then. Turns out we were wrong. Ray Cebulski remembers a time 30 years ago: "Hi Gary, after much thought more things are coming back to memory, after all 30 years is a long time!!!! On the 1973 team that went to state the main players were Steve Curtis, Stuart Cebulski, Jack Rich, Rocky Houtchens, Joe Hals, with backups Rod Kessler, Dick Hoehn, Wayne Slaght, and others that I cannot remember right off. I know that Stuart had a scrapbook of it all. At that time SS was smallest B school in district, and Bigfork was the largest [with approx. 3 times as many kids,] and was a very formidable foe, along with Loyola. Corvallis and Darby were also in the district along with the others I mentioned yesterday (see below).

Hi Gary, We were class B at that time, we started out as class C, went to B. back to C and then back to B., At that time [1973] we were B, and we were playing Loyola, St. Ignatius, Thompson Falls, Big Fork, etc. In fact in 1974 we had a very good team, [same kids I mentioned in 1973] won almost every game, went in as favorites of the district and fell on our faces. Lost to Thompson Falls, then to Big Fork, took 4th in District, and everyone was plenty upset including us. In 1973 we beat Loyola at Hamilton to get to go to state, put Loyola out of the running, which upset them plenty, as they were the favorites. There was a big hullaballoo in Missoulian with letters to the editor flying pro and con. Lots of fun. I think the Loyola coach damed near lost his job over the deal. We remember this very well, as that was the first year we had kids in the high school up here. Stuart transferred from Sentinel High School, he was a junior, and was on Sentinel jr. varsity team when we moved in Dec. of 1972. ---Thanks Rav!

Imagine the "Corps of Discovery" in the Blackfoot.

Officers of the Blackfoot River Chapter of Lewis & Clark Trail Heritage Foundation are seeking people to design and develop a hat pin depicting the Lewis and Clark Expedition through the Blackfoot "River of the Road to the Buffalo" Valley.

Captain Meriwether Lewis and nine men with 14 horses plus one dog. traveled upstream along the Blackfoot River on their return trip from the Pacific in 1806. They dined on fresh shotantelope and guamash in the lower end of Ninemile Prairie and camped near Monture Creek on July 5th. They did not see a large bull at Clearwater Junction but did make note of seeing a swan as they crossed "Werners Creek," now called the Clearwater River.

The main purpose of the hat pin will be to provide visitors and local people interested in the Lewis and Clark Expedition with a unique souvenir from the area, especially as they partake in the Bicentennial Celebration during the next three years. Ideas can be presented either as graphic art, sketches, or narrative form. Napkins, matchbook covers, parchment or any other media is acceptable. This project is a part of their mission as "Keepers of the Story, Stewards of the Trail."

Individuals who have studied the Lewis and Clark expedition, know the history of the area, have special interests in local plants and animals, or any other unique skills, knowledge or ability will be especially adept at providing good ideas for the pin. Eskimo sewing, carving and basketry will also be on display. For more information call Swan Ecosystem Center at 754-3137.









Last week when Peter Kolb informed his audience at the Seeley Lake Senior Center that his job is a hybrid of two, I remembered a story.

My story involves Arnie Foss, the long-time FWP Wildlife Manager in Bozeman. Quite a few years back, someone asked Arnie what he thought of creating a new Conservation Officer position in FWP, which would be a combination biologist and warden.

"It's like the Jeep Wagoneer," Arnie answered, "It's supposed to be half four-wheel-drive, and half family car."



"So, it's no good at either one. Unlike Arnie's Wagoneer, I discovered that Peter Kolb is very good at both parts of his job. On the one hand, he is part of the Extension Service at Montana State University. Bozeman. But, he is based at the University of Montana, Missoula, and is a professor of forestry there.

And, his presentation to those who later that evening became the "Clearwater Resource Council" was very informative and thought provok-

For one thing, I couldn't help appreciating how far our society has come in recent decades as I watched the antics of Peter's tiny, but highly mobile, daughter while she amused herself and the audience during Peter's presentation. I marveled at how flawlessly he would explain complex concepts while occasionally reaching out with his hand and calmly addressing his daughter. At one point, however. Peter had to interrupt himself completely to save the Seniors' half-finished jigsaw puzzle from its imminent demise.

"I'm babysitting," Peter explained to the chuckling crowd, and then picked up right where he left off, his voice elevated in volume slightly to overwhelm a brief temper tantrum. (Most importantly, the puzzle was preserved.)

While his daughter provided the charm, Peter provided the information. His topic was "Forest Health." Peter said he laughed when invited to give a 45-minute presentation on the subject. He laughed harder when the inviter tried to accommodate him by allowing less time, if that's what Peter would prefer.

"I was thinking of a week," Peter



But, he cautioned that logging should not begin without a clear understanding of the particular site you're working on.

The example that stuck in my head was one of a young Douglas-fir stand on a dry slope. Forest managers decided to thin the stand to reduce

"This Douglas-fir stand originally established in a clump that provided shade," Peter explained. "The trees developed shallow root systems to take advantage of the surface moisture beneath the shade. When the shade was thinned on this exposed site, soil temperatures increased, moisture was lost in the shallow root zone, and the remaining trees couldn't survive

I don't know about you, but I'm not sure I could have predicted that one if I had been the manager involved. Of course, in many cases thinning improves growth rates of Douglas-fir. But, knowing the difference ahead of time is what might make forestry rocket science.

sembled were more convinced than ever of their interest in helping to develop community based land management solutions around Seeley Lake. They needed a name.


In discussion, there was strong interest expressed in the forests of the Seelev Lake area. Some pointed out that a forest is trees, water, grasses, insects, wildlife, and air. So, the term "forest" is an all-inclusive one.

Still, others wanted to be clear that the group is interested in all local resources, and ultimately the group voted to use the term "resource council" instead of "forest council." It became the "Clearwater Resource Council" when all agreed that Clearwater described the area of interest better than Seelev.

Keep watch in the Pathfinder and an ear to the ground to learn more about this emerging organization of citizens in your community.


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Swan Song Patricia (Pat) Gossard
