Energy Share needs your help

costs, help from Energy Share of Montana is more critical than ever for the working poor and families on fixed incomes who are facing energy emergencies. Last year the organization helped 1,824 households with \$534,343 in assistance. This heating season Glen Phelps, Energy Share Board member representing NorthWestern Energy, sees that need growing.

Editorial Comment

"Energy prices are going to be higher this winter particularly for natural gas and propane, which are popular heating fuels. With 90,000 Montana households below 150% of poverty according to the census, the need for our services will also dramatically increase," said Phelps.

At the local level last year Energy Share helped 288 households (about 855 individuals), a small percentage of the 34,161 people who are at or below 150% of poverty in this area. Jim Morton, Director of the local program operator for Energy Share, echoed Phelps' thoughts. "We expect to receive more calls for assistance than ever this year," said Morton. "The poor and working poor are struggling to keep up with the cost of living."

This November all Montanans will find Energy Share donation envelopes or pledge cards in their utility bill or Rural Montana electric cooperative magazine. Last year \$174,000 was raised and 100% of these gifts went directly to families

With the stark reality of increased energy in need. Donations stay in local areas - a Missoula resident's gift to Energy Share will stay in the surrounding counties.

Another way Energy Share plans to meet the needs of low-income families is to grow its endowment to a level at which it can be independent of any state funding. Under a Montana law established by the 1997 Legislature, a corporate or planned gift to an endowment such as Energy Share's qualifies for a 20 percent Montana tax credit for corporate donations and a 40 percent tax credit for individual donations. Maximum credit allowed for both donations annually is \$10,000.

Energy Share is a private non-profit organi zation that was established in 1982 to help Montanans with energy emergencies. Since its inception, Energy Share has assisted over 20,000 families with more than 5.8 million dollars.

Energy Share concentrates on providing onetime assistance for the majority of recipients. Families who live from paycheck to paycheck face financial emergencies when unexpected expenses occur. Frequently, these recipients repay Energy Share after their emergency or need has ended Those in need of energy assistance this winter can apply through the District XI HRC office located at 1801 South Higgins in Missoula, or call 1-800-777-7589 for more information.

Elk Migrating in Fits and Starts This Fall

Stand back. Elk migration is underway.

Our local elk migrations pale in comparison to annual movements of tween. 3,159 miles that have been documented for barren-ground caribou. Still, the 15-25 mile journey that most Blackfoot-Clearwater elk undertake every fall and spring inspires our imaginations.

Elk trailing over mountain passes through belly deep snow. A winding river of frozen elk breath flowing under a full moon. Clods of snow and mud kicked up from dozens of thundering hooves. The squealing of cows and calves as they fan out into the open from the confines of a long trail through deep forest, high-stepping and wheeling like horses turned out of the corral

For me, the evidence of elk migration is in the success of hunters on the Game Range. There are always a few, maybe 50-100, elk on the Game Range, or at least in the near vicinity. Usually, the opening shots of the gen- moved them is anyone's guess. eral hunting season drive these local elk to the comparative safety of the Game Range, and hunters with special licenses kill 10 or so during this neriod.

So, what do 1,200 elk look like in migration?

In the Blackfoot-Clearwater, they look like 15 here and 30 there. There'll be no running naked with the thousands, like the man among the caribou in Never Cry Wolf (the movie). No, in these parts it's more like ghosts of light hair patches and dark legs moving so silently and quickly through the thick timber that you can't really remember what made you turn abruptly to look in the first place. Followed by a crack or two of brush in the distance. Then dead silence.

Especially in a year like this one, when so far there's been no great event to move most elk all at once, the migration comes in fits and starts. This year, a second bunch of a hundred or more came to the Game Range on about the first of November. What

There had been quite a drop in barometric pressure when a low pressure system passed, with a stiff wind developing ahead of an arriving cold front and enough snow to remind us That's about where we stood on of winter, but nothing severe.

By this past weekend, a few hundred elk had made it to their winter destination. Reported elk harvest umped to about 35 on the Game Range by midday Saturday, and hunters were bumping into elk in many locations. This came with a prolonged and record-setting (in many areas) cold snap for this early in the fall.

I used to believe that deep snow was the primary driver of fall elk migration. But, my observations of elk responding to zero-degree temperatures last week have caused me to rethink my theory. On the Paws Up Ranch, dozens of elk fed in the cattle pasture without so much as lifting their heads when car after car passed within 100 yards on Highway 200. It looked like the behavior of elk in midwinter.

Perhaps the cold temperatures placed energetic demands on elk that drove them to prime feeding areas in the face of hunting pressure. If so, I would expect elk to disperse a bit as temperatures moderate this week.

Disperse, maybe. But, will we see a reverse migration? Almost certainly not. When Mark Hurley was following radioed elk in the late '80s and early '90s, he found that once elk migrated



confine their movements to the Game Range boundaries, and not beyond, regardless of how many hunters we allowed in Hunting District 282.

This year there are 100 hunters with A-7 licenses for Hunting District 282. That's up from any of the previous 7 years, and reflects an approval in August by the Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks Commission for FWP to tat on the Game Range, and to mancap the rate of increase for this elk population.

And, just last Friday the Commission approved yet another FWP proposal, this time to extend the hunting season in Hunting District 282 until the terializes.

During the Great Depression he kept up a winter trapping circuit near Williams to help feed the family, and sometimes "rode the rails" on freight trains to seek work in neighboring cities. Montana Voters Have New Rights and Responsibilities

Next year, Montana voters will begin noticing some important changes in the way they vote.

These changes-the result of new federal and state election laws----will significantly improve the accessibility and integrity of our elections. And elections, after all, are the fundamental building block of our democracy.


We can only have confidence in our government if we have confidence in the way our government is elected.

In the coming months, my office will launch a comprehensive campaign aimed at educating Montanans about these changes. I hope you will keep your eyes and ears open for details as we count down to the important 2004 primary and general elections. To begin with, my

office has dedicated a page of its Web site to explaining the new election reforms. You can visit this Web site at www.sos.state.mt.us. Just click on the button marked "Help America Vote Act."

Among the changes you will notice beginning in 2004:

• You will be required to show an ID when you vote. Acceptable identification includes a driver's license, student ID, tribal ID, or voter confirmation notice. You may also use a utility bill. bank statement, or any other government document that includes

your name and current address. This new provision ensures that everyone's vote counts-and counts only once.

• You will have the right to vote provisionally on Election Day. If your name is not on the list of registered voters or if you forget to bring ID to the polls, you are still entitled to vote. Local election officials will count your ballot after they have verified your registration or ID. Because of this new law, no one will be turned away from the polls on Election Day. - You will have the right to use voting equipment specially designed for people with disabilities. Every polling place will have at least one such voting device, called a DRE. They will enable people, especially those with visual impairments, to vote independently----for the first time ever in Montana. • You will have the right to file a complaint with my office if you believe there has been a violation of an election law.
