



İ hear a lot about the good old days, and I sure hope I didn't miss

If you take the expression "good old days" literally, you would have to conclude that only old days are good days. What makes old days good?

Well, old days are over, for one thing.

Fortunately, the human spirit clings to a brighter outlook. Speaking objectively, the old days are more distant from memory than the days we are living now. So, something good that happened in the past need not be clouded by the details that diminish its goodness, whereas today's good experiences are blurred by the back that still one? aches at the end of the day.

"This is how I used to feel," you say to your companion. And even though it makes you smile. the moment only seems to matter when you link it to the past. As soon as your knee starts to creak again, you're back in the reality of the bad "new" days.

On the other hand, I can still remember when the good old days most assuredly lay ahead of me. As a teenager, dreaming first of what it was going to be like to be Mickey Mantle when I grew up, then graduating to Jerry West, and finally mutating into a modern day Jeremiah Johnson (with a deadly jump shot, of course), my best days were over the next horizon.

So, does anybody know a good old day when they are living

Well, I'm here to tell you hunters that the season that ended last Sunday was better than it's been

That's according to the final tally of elk, mule deer, and whitetailed deer from Bonner Check Staall present experiences to the faded tion this hunting season. Hunters checked 199 elk, 162 mule deer, and 690 white-tailed deer through Bonner this year. Last year, which bore a pretty close resemblance to the "bad old days," hunters checked only 100 elk, 100 mule deer, and 470 whitetails through

The last time the elk harvest through Bonner matched or exceeded 199 was in 1994, when a whopping 280 elk were checked. But, the record (since 1980) was set in 1988 when 298 elk passed

The last time that 852 or more deer came through Bonner was in 1996. The best season for putting deer in the freezer (since 1980) was 1994, with a record of 1,657 checked.

So, what does this information really tell us? Most of you who killed elk or deer in the Blackfoot or Clearwater country this year didn't drive through Bonner with them. Or if you did for some reason, the check station might have been closed. (It's only open from about 8:00 A.M. to 8:00 P.M., and only on the first 8 days, and weekends thereafter.)

Admittedly, we could end hunger in Montana with the deer and elk that we fail to count at Bonner Check Station. But, by Bonner. Only 1999 was a worse operating the check station in the

exact same way every year, year after year, we do obtain a trend in the harvest.

In other words, Bonner Check Station is one way to find out if you're living in the "good old days," or not.

And, the answer? If you started hunting after 1996, the answer is certainly yes, these are the good old days. But, if you were hunting elk or deer in the period from 1984-1994, well, the curmudgeons among you would have to say that things just aren't like they used to be.

What made 1984-1994 so

By the mid-1980s elk numbers across Region 2 were starting to build in response to stricter controls by FWP on the harvest of cows and calves. Deer numbers were rebounding after the severe winters of the early 1970s, and also in response to regulations that reduced doe harvest. As elk and deer increased, so did FWP's allocation of permits to kill more elk and deer.

Add in some mild winters, good hunting weather, and an increasing number of hunters afield and you get lots of elk and deer going home in the backs of pick-

for hunters that elk and deer populations were starting to show reductions in some areas. So, FWP began issuing fewer special licenses to kill antlerless elk and

Then the winter of 1996-97 hit, and elk, deer, and antlerless hunting opportunities plummeted. Since then we've had mild winters, but often dry summers as well, and hunting weather has varied from bad to worse.

The results at Bonner may herald the dawning of a new day. We know that elk numbers are high, and deer are trending upward again. FWP is starting to reward more hunters with more special permits again. And, finally the weather is cooperating in hunting season.

In fact, things were so good

Until this year.

Whether this new day will be "good," or "bad," is entirely up to

In accordance with Rule 17.55.108 of the Administrative Rules of Montana (ARM), the Montana Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) hereby gives notice of a 30-day public comment period on its intent to list the Pyramid Mountain Lumber I acility in Seeley Lake, MT, on the Comprehensive Environmental Cleanup and Responsibility Act (CECRA) priority list. The Pyramid Mountain Lumber Facility is located in Township 16 North, Range 15 West, Section 3 of Missoula County, Montana. DEO has confirmed a release of a hazardous or deleterious substance that may pose an imminent and substantial threat to public health, safety, or welfare or the environ-

DEO has determined that remedial actions are required to address contamination at the Pyramid Mountain Lumber Facility. An October 2001 Phase II Environmental Investigation report and a January 2002 Environmental Site Investigation Report document the presence of pentachlorophenol and petroleum contamination in subsurface soil and groundwater at the facility. Contaminant concentrations in subsurface soil exceed U.S. **Environmental Protection Agency** (EPA) preliminary remediation goals and/or soil screening levels. Contaminant concentrations in groundwater exceed EPA maximum contaminant levels and Montana numeric water quality stan-

Therefore, DEQ proposes that the facility be included on the CECRA priority list. The public comment period will begin on Dec. 10, 2003, and end on Jan. 8, 2004, at 5 p.m. Copies of facility-related documents are available at the DEQ Site Response Section of the Hazardous Waste Site Cleanup Bureau office located at 1100 North Last Chance Gulch in Helena. DEO will hold a public meeting upon written request to DEO on or before Jan. 8, 2004, by 10 or more persons, a group composed of 10 or more persons, or by a local governing body. Renee uses most of her home for the operation of Paws-Up, which includes providing heat and water. So far both Renee and Elinor have covered much of the cost out of their own pock-



We have some great package rates, especially for Priority Mail, in addition to Delivery Confirmation, low-rate package insurance coverage, colorful holiday stamps and other neat mailing services."

For mailing cards and packages within the U.S. using regular and Priority Mail, the Post Office recommends mailing out-of-state by Saturday, Dec. 20; and in-state by Monday, Dec. 22. Carroll student from Swan Valley has flair for design

(Editor's note: the following story and photo about Swan Valley college student Shannon O'Brien is reprinted with permission from the Helena Independent Record. O'Brien is a 2000 graduate of Seeley-Swan High School).

Last year, Carroll student Shannon O'Brien needed to fill her arts requirement for graduation, and being a computer science and mathematics major, she automatically turned to a desktop publishing class to get the requirement out of the way.

What she didn't know that first day of class, was that she had a natural flair for computer-aided design and her work would one day be in use.

To link learning with realworld experience, O'Brien's teacher, Linda McCray, presented both sections of the desktop pubments to redesign print materials for local nonprofit organizations.

One of her students' first projects was a redesign of the brochure used by the Helena Ad Club. a local group of advertising and marketing professionals.

"I just had a regular sheet of paper — eight and a half by 11 and she just gave us the assignment. I looked at the A and I just thought of the triangle, and it all came through," O'Brien said.

Her design, in bold black and white, and folded into a triangle, was adopted last spring by the organization's board of directors, and the Helena Ad Club met Wednesday evening at the Myrna Loy for the unveiling of the new brochure and a viewing of the Clio Awards — advertising's answer to the Oscars.

The new brochures were well received by the group, and most

members gathered up a handful to take with them.

"I can't say that I've ever seen the triangle," McCray said at the gathering. "Because of the shape, it's not mail-able, but for a small group like ours, it doesn't matter."

O'Brien, a native of the Swan Valley, has applied to Carnegie Mellon University in Pittsburg, where she plans to study Human Computer Interaction as a graduate student. While she said she won't be pursuing a career in design, she will continue with computer design on her own when she has free time.

O'Brien wasn't the only student designer to have a project selected for print and distribution. A poster, designed by Chris Curtis, also a student in McCray's desktop publishing class, was selected for print by Spring Meadow Re-




